5/15/24 Week 20: Spring Mission Feeding Tammy Trent Hope Carpenter

In the studio

TAMMY: Hello everybody. Welcome to *LIFE Today*. I'm Tammy Trent and I'm so glad you're here with us.

Our guest today is someone I really love and I've watched the Lord do miracles in her life and her marriage. But Hope Carpenter nearly destroyed her family, her church, and her ministry. On the outside, she was living a facade of a perfect life. But she was dying inside, living a double life, and didn't know how to ask for help, until one day it all came crashing down. In her book, *The Most Beautiful Disaster*, how God makes miracles out of our mistakes, Hope shares her remarkable journey from the brink of destruction to redemption. Hope Carpenter, I love you! I'm so glad you're here.

HOPE: I'm so glad to be here. What a journey, right?

TAMMY: Oh! A total journey—and we have so much to unpack. I loved your book. So I want to start up at the top because there might be a lot of people that don't know you. And honestly, there is a lot of your story I don't know the depth of. So today I think it is going to be powerful for a lot of people.

But you're an open book. That's what I love so much about you. You're an open book. You're open about all the challenges you've had in your life and throughout your life. But take us back to the beginning days of your life, and maybe how in the early days of your childhood might have become a downfall in your life.

HOPE: Tammy, I'm not one of those girls—I'm not one of those people who like to blame people for the things I've done. But I do believe that every adult problem is an unresolved child problem. I believe that everything that's touched our life, what we did or did not get growing up, you know, many of us come from broken homes. I always say we all come from dysfunctional families because no one is perfect, and you can't give what you don't have.

So I was raised in a very strict Southern Baptist home until my parents were filled with the Holy Spirit when I was 12 years old. We went to the Pentecostal Holiness Church. I've loved Jesus my whole life. I was saved when I was eight. I was filled with the Holy Spirit when I was 12. So church has been our whole life. But we had a lot of issues in our home. Today, people would call it abuse. Back then it was called being strict.

TAMMY: What kind of thing?

HOPE: Like the spankings with the switches where the blood runs down your legs, the punching across the room; those types of things because they didn't want me to end up like the other girls. So they were determined that I was going to be punished. That it was going to be harsh, that I was going to obey, I was going to be a good girl.

Well, I went on my first date and got raped. And so fearful of the consequences, I didn't even come home and tell my parents. So I carried that as a girl, as a young girl for years. And then that set up a cycle in me of fear that I don't want it ever taken from me like that again so I better offer it. So there are so many things. It's the perfect storm the devil creates. He wants to yoke you early so that you never get outside of that pattern, that way of thinking, that way of living.

The punishment was so harsh growing up that I would lie to stay out of trouble. Who wouldn't? Hope, did you do that? No, I did not do that. Hope did it though. Hope did it.

Usually, every time Hope did it. But the spankings and the punishment were so harsh that it set up a pattern of any time confrontation would come to my life I would lie.

TAMMY: So that pattern you're talking about started as a child, all these different little things, living out the different people's expectations, especially your family, your parents.

HOPE: Had to be perfect.

TAMMY: I was going to say living a perfect life, and then the lies creep in, and then all these things creep in. Did you have anybody to talk to? I can only imagine as a child into your teenage years that this probably then carried on into your marriage in 1990.

HOPE: Absolutely! I thought that by changing my last name and changing my address everything was going to be different. Everything was going to be great. It was going to be amazing. But that is not true. Even though I married an amazing man and I think Ron Carpenter walks on water. I really do! One day I'm going to wake up and realize he is an angel. I'm living with an angel. He is a good man.

But to me, even the rules of church and you've got to be there and you can't—even if you're sick you've got to go. And your kids have to be perfectly coiffed, and in the choir, and in G.A.'s and R.A.'s, and all the things kids do. You just had to be perfect, perfect, perfect. So the enemy comes and he tells you, "Maybe Ron's the problem."

TAMMY: Wow! So what did you do at that point? You're thinking, okay, I'm not the problem.

HOPE: I kept being a great wife. I kept being a great obedient wife.

TAMMY: And how did you do that?

HOPE: Pastor's wife, raising the kids—but on the inside, Tammy, and I describe this so

much in my book, I go into great detail in the book.

I felt like a pressure cooker. My grandmama used to cook green beans in a pressure cooker and it would just start boiling little by little by little, and then the top would blow. Well, my top blew when I turned 35 years old. One day I woke up and I said, I cannot live like this another day. This was 2004. I did not know what that meant. I just knew what I felt on the inside. Couldn't even rationalize where the feelings were coming from. I had no idea all I had been through was causing all this pain on the inside of me because I had swept it under the rug. I pressed the minimize button. I didn't talk about it. It's the kind of home, what happens in this home, what? Stays in this home. Yes!

TAMMY: That's right! When you talk about that, I think about hiding. There's been plenty of things in my life where I felt like even in the church like I can't share this with anybody. Nobody is going to understand. And honestly, if I am trusting Jesus, and walking with Jesus then I shouldn't, maybe my relationship with the Lord isn't very good if I'm going through this or thinking this way or having this struggle. But I certainly can't share it with anybody.

So I think that's when the hiding, and I think there are so many people that are so good at hiding things because they don't feel like they have help or don't even know how to untangle the mess they've got into. And even maybe, how deep is this mess? And I think in particular, people in the church. Maybe the church isn't a very good help with when people hide.

HOPE: I say that in the book. After I've gone through all this, I'm 55 now so I've learned a lot, been through a lot of counseling, and gotten a lot of help. Thank the Lord for it. I don't think we've done a very good job as a church—church as a whole globally at really meeting the needs of the people.

Jesus, I talk about this in the book too. When you come into the presence of Jesus, he creates such a climate where you feel safe and you can show your withered hand. You

know the story in the Bible, the man with the withered hand. He had one bad hand and he had one good hand. And Jesus came to him and said, "Stretch out your hand." And you know us church people, we would have gone whoa, here's my good hand! Here's all my rings and my good fingernails—not the one with the broken fingernails.

But what did he do? He immediately stretched out his broken place. And that's Jesus. That's not so much the church. We want to make sure everybody is perfect and everybody is performing well. You know you had a fight in the car but then you get to church and they're like, "How are you doing, Miss Tammy?"

"Oh, I'm blessed! I'm just great."

Everybody is great. But we're not great.

TAMMY: No, we're not great. I'm going to tell you, I've loved you for a long time because I came to your church and did a women's conference with you. This was in September of 2013. I remember it was probably just like a month later when I heard that everything came crashing down for you. But tell us about that season in your life because it has changed the whole trajectory of your life.

HOPE: Yes! It rescued my life.

TAMMY: Tell me about it.

HOPE: So my life, okay 2004 is when I woke up one day and said, something was wrong. I can't live like this. I veered off the path just a little bit. I was going this way, the perfect little preacher's wife. Performing, being great but dying on the inside. I veered off. And listen, I laugh about it now but it was very traumatic at the time. In 2004, I went and bought a six-pack of beer, I bought three secular CDs and I bought a bikini. [Laughing]

TAMMY: All the things you shouldn't do or have as a pastor's wife.

HOPE: I just thought I'm going to hell on a slip-and-slide. So here I am doing all these things that were taboo but for the first time in my life, I felt like I could breathe. Since then in counseling, I've learned that is called individuation. It is what you're supposed to do at 12, 13, 14 in the safety of parameters of a home. Like touching your finger to a stove and saying, ooh, that burned. I'll never do that again. I never had those experiences. I was never allowed.

So at 35, I started. I did that for nine years. I ended up in places I never dreamed; that I would be doing things that I never thought I would do. I looked back in 2013 and thought, how did I get here? I loved my husband still. I loved Jesus with all my heart but I was so broken and had nowhere to go. Did not know how to get fixed. I couldn't even put a finger on how I got here or what was wrong.

So in 2013, I came to my husband and I said—everything was crashing around me. People were seeing Hope is not the same. You saw it. So I had to sit him down. We had argued. He had suspected. I was honest. Said, I've been unfaithful. This is what's been going on in my life. And I thought, Ron being the angel he is was just going to rescue me and help me get out of this mess. And he said, "You've got 30 minutes. Get your stuff, get out."

TAMMY: Wow, Hope! Wow!

HOPE: Thus the title of this book. We were the number three top story that year in the Christian news. How sad is that? He had people saying kick her out. Don't take her back. And he had filed for divorce. He told me, he said, "I love you," he said, "but being with you is too painful."

TAMMY: What did you do?

HOPE: I went to a ministry place called Living Waters Ministry in North Carolina that

we sent the "other broken people" to over the years.

TAMMY: You were walking in.

HOPE: Yeah, the island of the broken people, as if nobody else is. We're all broken. We're all broken and in need of Jesus. So I went there and I said, "I don't know what I'm going to do but I just need a bed tonight. I just need to get my mind together."

This little lady comes in. She takes her little sweater. The next morning she says, "Ready? Are you ready to get busy? We're going to dig into the bottom of this."

She never judged me. She never asked me who were you with? How many times? None of the things that mattered. She wanted to find out not what I did, but how I got there. "What happened to you?" That's the question she asked me. Not what I did, but, "Hope, what happened to you?" And we started going back all the way to childhood in unmet needs in my life, and the rape, and never getting counseling, and how it set me up to perform in performance orientation.

And for the very first time, Tammy, I've been in ministry my whole life, I was 43 at the time, and I ran straight into the unconditional love of Jesus for the first time in my life. And so I wrote this book, *The Most Beautiful Disaster*: "How God makes miracles out of our mistakes." Because I said, God, the world is sitting here trying to reconcile it. But to me, you saved me. This saved me.

TAMMY: Yes! You were set up for the story of your life—the real story of your life.

HOPE: And real freedom.

TAMMY: I was just going to say, Hope, there is so much freedom in your life. And I feel like your ministry is such a place, as I've watched you, of helping other people get free, especially in churches.

HOPE: That's what I live for.

TAMMY: Yes! Especially in churches and leadership, people that don't know where to go. What would you say to someone today who is struggling with understanding like freedom, even? Is freedom possible? Is it a one-and-done? Or is it a process of freedom every single day? What does that look like?

HOPE: For me, I can't speak for everybody but I was raised to where you go to the altar, you get prayed for, and you get up and it is supposed to be gone. Well, I did that for years and it didn't go away.

TAMMY: And I think, can I just say, I think many people are there. And they struggle with that.

HOPE: It is frustrating because you want to be free. You want to walk in freedom. But I do believe there is so much history in our life, there are so many memories, and there's so much we've been through. There is so much emotional trauma it reshapes, actually, our brains.

I'm not a doctor but I've done enough research to know that trauma reshapes your brain in how you think and how you process. I think we get stuck in these patterns and we expect God to be a genie in a bottle and he is not. There is a process of renewing our minds. There is a process of dying daily. Nobody wants to talk about dying, Tammy.

TAMMY: No, they don't!

HOPE: No! We want to say all the pretty scriptures and all the faith scriptures. And I believe all that too but Jesus said, "I've carried this cross, you've got to pick up one too." There's going to be some thorns in your side just like Apostle Paul did that keeps you from thinking that you're bigger than you are. There are times you've got to wrestle with

God and you're going to get up with a limp. It is a process that God puts us through and he knows what we need because he is a good daddy.

TAMMY: He so does. But Hope, you also put in the work. You put in the hard work. Healing is hard. I know the process of healing in my own life and it takes work, it takes surrender, it takes honesty. I had to be courageous at times, but it took work for me and it didn't come overnight. Your healing didn't come overnight. You stayed in that—

HOPE: Years!

TAMMY: Yes! I feel like sometimes there are different areas of my life where I'm still healing from the loss of my husband. But God is capable and there is healing and it takes work. You stayed in it. That's the thing that makes me so proud when I hear your story and what God has done, how he's rescued you, how he's redeemed the story, how he's restored your marriage and your ministry, and how God is using it now. Nothing is wasted.

I look back at that September 2013 girl and I sit before you now and say, man, God has done such a work in your life. What an honor for me to be with you today. And praying that people will get something from this. Even if they're just in a bad place, God is still in it with them. He wants to take them to a place of total healing and restoration.

HOPE: I think people get hopeless. When you've been in pain so long, when you've been in trauma so long, when you've been to the altar so many times, people get hopeless. But I want to tell people listening today, listen, there is nothing too big for God. We were counted out. I counted myself out. I thought there was no way God could ever dig to the bottom of my mess and my trauma. Or ever redeem it or anyone would ever listen; that God could ever use me again. I have ministered to thousands and thousands of women across the globe in the last 12 years. And I've seen miracle after miracle after miracle. But you do have to put in the work, it does take time. God is not a genie in a bottle but with him nothing is impossible.

TAMMY: Amen! Amen! I love that you just say hope too. Hope is something that is a gift. It is truly a gift from God. It has been a gift from God to me in my life and hanging on to hope. You've done that.

I'm telling you, there are some special people right now who I've got to spend my time with in Ethiopia recently, who have been hanging on by a thread, who have been hanging on for hope. I want to share this story with you right now. I'm going to come back on the other side and we'll talk about it and I'll wrap up some end thoughts with Hope. So don't go away but take a moment and watch this.

On the mission field

ISAK: I've just been spending some time with Comida. He's a father. He's been explaining to us, he struggled—his life. He's disabled as well and so he is not able to work as most men would be. His father was a real help to him but then he explained that some months ago his father died because there wasn't any food, is the way that he explained it. So you could tell as he described his story, the fear, the pain, the struggle.

>> We are just trying to live one day at a time. My biggest fear is hunger. I don't know what will happen tomorrow.

ISAK: Because of eight years of drought in this area there is no food. He said how in the past when there was, they would grow. And even if they were struggling, they could go to the neighbors and the neighbors would help them. But now, he can't even get that assistance because his neighbors are the same as him—they don't have any food.

Comida's story is one of thousands of families in this area in the same plight. Not because they didn't do enough—because it didn't rain enough. They're doing everything they can do. This man is doing what he really can do to provide for his children. Everything he can do is not enough. I need you to understand that this is a crisis—an absolute food crisis.

There's a way to fix this. There's a way to change this. We can't make it rain but we can provide the food that's needed. If you'll open your heart today and you'll do what you can do, because that gift enables us to respond to this family and many other families in this area that need our response right now.
