Week 35: Christmas Shoes and Smiles James Robison Dennis Quaid #2

In the studio

JAMES: Well, I feel like I'm talking to a very famous person. Actually, Dennis Quaid is here. He is such a gifted person and *I Can Only Imagine* was a really big deal.

DENNIS: That was a beautiful movie. Bart was on the set every day and I can't imagine watching your life played out like that. It was pretty amazing. What an incredible story of redemption.

JAMES: And what you've done with the *Reagan* movie is an incredible story too. How did Reagan handle the challenges he dealt with, with those bullies? How did he handle that?

DENNIS: Well, he felt the only way to handle a bully was to stand up to him. That was a lesson he learned early on. When it came to the Soviet Union and communism, he had seen the effects of it. It's a free country and like Reagan said, democracy can handle it. I have faith in the American people that they will right the ship when it comes to this. The alternative is not so great. We've gone through periods in this country, many, many, eras where we've had division, people at each other's throats. We had a Civil War. We had a great challenge during Jefferson's time that basically got down to the Constitution. It's been tested but it's always righted the ship. I think through prayer and the education of people; just read the Constitution. That's all you have to do.

JAMES: They can go back to it. Get it back in place. And there will be no perfect person. God doesn't have perfect people. He uses imperfect people to accomplish his perfect will. But those people who accomplish his will, will be moving toward the principles in line with his will. And in line with not giving the deceiver, the father of lies, the divider and the destroyer, not giving him the controls. You don't do it. Because he throws out all principles, everything sound. Reagan restored those principles. We've got to have that.

We don't have perfect people. Reagan would have said I'm not perfect. As a matter of fact, he probably looked down on himself. He was a man.

DENNIS: We're all people. We all have a past and we all have a present we're not perfect in, as well. It's about people's hearts. Where are their hearts? And what are their deeds? I think that's what I judge by.

JAMES: What was one of the most exciting things you remember doing in the movie? What was an exciting moment or what stood out?

DENNIS: First off, we were in the White House. We built an Oval Office, which was really something because I've been there many times and it was perfect. But I really—my favorite Reagan in the sense of playing him and stuff was like—about that time that he was governor of California, the brown suit Reagan. He was tough. He really was. He was tough. He was like—he was principled. That's the unique thing about him. That's what this country needs. Not the men, the principles, adhering to those principles. He lived by them. Even when he was in the minority, he lived by them. That's the wisdom in him. But the speech that—one of my favorite scenes is the speech that he gave for Goldwater.

JAMES: In '64 or so when everybody thought he should be president?

DENNIS: They call it "the speech" but it was basically a clarion call to fighting communism, the number one issue.

JAMES: What a speech!

DENNIS: Well, he changed the world.

JAMES: Yeah, he did. But when he got to be president, he was able to put the important factors that played a big role in the greatness of that speech, he was able to put them in action. He was able to do it with great wisdom with great people around him who were not committed to being seen or praised but were really wanting to lead and protect that, which was essential for the future of freedom. And they did it miraculously.

DENNIS: Well, I think our country had a policy of appeasement with the Soviet Union. And the American people are very generous. They want to be friends with everybody but there are some bad actors out there in the world. When it came to the Soviet Union, I remember the years preceding Reagan in office, when they gave away a B-1 bomber without getting anything back. Meanwhile, the Soviets were building their military straight up. There were the kind of proxy wars going on in Africa, going on in Central America. There was—I think there was about a 90 percent chance that there was going to be a nuclear confrontation at some point. By appeasement, that's the kind of thing that happens if you don't stop people. He was the first to say "no" to the Soviets. And I think that surprised them. That's what—it took a cold warrior like him to end the Cold War.

JAMES: The media made fun of the possibility of Star Wars, a laser taking down the missiles. But the fact was, and they could see it, they just weren't able to buy these scientists and these people. Not the Germans couldn't, nobody could, nobody else in the world could.

But the fact was they knew everything he was saying and what they knew scientists could do, that we could bring their missiles down before they ever reached altitude.

DENNIS: At the time that was maybe a decade or two away.

JAMES: Yeah, but they didn't know that.

DENNIS: But he didn't let them know that. He figured that maybe they believed it 20 percent. But 20 percent is enough to change their mind. We even like in negotiation, what I thought was brilliant, was that he offered to share it with them. [Laughing] Knowing they would say no.

JAMES: It was great. Do you think that the movie and some of my staff, well, my vice president was with Reagan in the White House all the years? His mother was really the person who got Reagan to sit down with me and listen to me when he needed to in answer to the prayers of Billy Graham. That really is what happened. It is a very interesting story.

But I'm telling you that you could just see the greatness of this man leading, and leading us back to principles. Do you think that comes out in the movie to inspire people to see that we can actually take a stand for principles and save the future of freedom?

DENNIS: Well, you see where Reagan came from. You see scenes in Dixon, Illinois. How he grew up. The way he grew up. The generation that he comes from, is the greatest generation that had a tough time growing up in the Depression and fought World War II. Wanted their kids to have a better life than they had, the dream, the American dream that at the time when he became president people thought was over. America was in decline. He brought us back.

Also, he was a very humble man. I also found out at that ranch when I went to visit the ranch, Reagan was not a rich man. He wasn't. He made America rich and stuff—

JAMES: He didn't try to get rich off of us either. That just wasn't there.

DENNIS: No! You go to the ranch and you can tell. He was—you know, history will

continue to prove it. He was one of the greatest presidents this country has ever had.

JAMES: You know you've made some comments; not only did you play the role and respect him, but your faith journey was similar. That's interesting to me because faith is for some reason important to you. Why is your faith in God so important to you? And then tell maybe the similarities and the journey.

DENNIS: Well, I grew up in a Baptist church in Houston. I think my mother had a great influence on me spiritually. Very similar to Reagan, I think, our mothers. My dad was an alcoholic as well but a great guy at the same time. I think it was very similar. But I got disillusioned I think with what I called churchianity.

JAMES: Tiring.

DENNIS: In my teens at the time I started turning to different things, eastern philosophy which led me to study things. I'd read the Bible like when I was 18 but I read The Dhammapada. I read the Bhagavad Gita. I read the Qur'an. And then I came back. When I read the Bible again 20 years later, I came back to the red words of Jesus. That's what brought me back. Because that was the beginning of what it was really all about, a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. That was the beginning of that and that's what I have now. And that's—you don't need anything else but that.

JAMES: You know, both of us, and I was born in Houston and a product of rape. A doctor wouldn't abort me so here I am. But I had a miracle rebirth. I do see the danger of religious positions that cause you to become self-righteous; think you're the one right and you become an attacker of others. I think self-righteousness, because he is the only one righteous, is one of the biggest enemies God's righteousness has. I think church people can be as mean as the mafia.

DENNIS: Yeah, but they can also be really great too. When you find your home church.

JAMES: It is whether you go with his principles and his practices and his ways, or

whether you go with your thoughts. And like the Pharisees—the Pharisees had

memorized the first five books of the Bible. They're the number one murderer of Jesus.

They were the ones that demanded it.

DENNIS: You're talking about if you make it about Jesus or if you make it about me.

Right?

JAMES: And your view and your position and you're the ones right. The unkindness

there is so far from the unconditional love of God.

Father, I have been praying and praying and I'm watching it happen where people will put

down their differences that have made them violent to where they contradict the very

Bible they claim to be defending. Lord, please deliver us from that; in Jesus' name.

If you saw this religious junk—

DENNIS: I think when you're talking about—but I think what you're talking about is

really—it is very similar, the times are, back to when Reagan came in.

JAMES: Exactly!

DENNIS: Because really, what we're talking about is a spiritual problem.

JAMES: It is!

DENNIS: It is a spiritual problem within a nation that starts with individuals. It is all

local and it grows. But that's what—I think has already happened, I have a feeling, that

started around COVID. People stayed home and they had to connect with each other

again. And as horrible as it was, I think it was the beginning of a spiritual revolution,

which I think is going to spread.

JAMES: And if we come together around those principles that you and I are talking about, we can see freedom saved, extended, and more effective than ever.

DENNIS: I think we also need to reach across the aisle, back and forth. We need, I mean Republicans, Democrats, we pass each other on the streets every day without knowing. We go into each other's shops. We have relationships. We're all people. We're all Americans. And we all want the same thing for our families, for our country.

We need more of what Reagan and the Speaker of the House had back then. If you can fight all day but at the end of the day, they're friends.

JAMES: You said in our last show it was a spiritual battle. And the spiritual force, the father of lies, the deceiver, the divider, the destroyer, he does like to be in control. He is in control of much of what is going on in our country because he is in control of too many of the people. Now we want to see that broken. We want to see his power broken because the king has come. We want his will done on his earth, which means it can be. He told us to pray that.

Would you mind leading us in a prayer that we would return to the principles that made us great, that we must return to in order for freedom to be extended? Would you pray that we would do that as the American people?

DENNIS: Yes, sir! Lord God, we really need you. Our country needs you. We as individuals need you to open our eyes, open our hearts, and also let us be open-minded to hear your voice and hear the way. Let us not be so full of ourselves and self-righteous. Let us allow you to do your work, Lord. We pray in Jesus' name. Amen.
