"LIFE's Impact"

Studio discussion:

JAMES: Well, I'm James Robison. My wife, Betty and I welcome you to *Life Today*. We have our son, Randy with us. Randy has four children. They're married, and they're just fabulous children. What a blessing! What a joy they've been. He now has two grandsons. He's just come back from the mission field. But I'm telling you, Randy has been with the ministry, Randy, how many years with the ministry? You traveled with me when you were basically a teenager and a kid. But how long have you been active where you've been to the mission field, and it seemed to capture your heart?

RANDY: I feel like I've been with the ministry for 55 years, which is how old I am. But it was early, right after I graduated from Oral Roberts University, that I first went to Mozambique. Peter Pretorius flew the plane. I sat in the Co-Pilot's seat, totally unqualified. So if there had been a problem, we wouldn't be here today. But when Peter showed you what was happening in Mozambique, it broke your heart. Y'all went, and you saw firsthand. Which you can talk about it, you can hear about it, you can see pictures, but what's interesting is when you're there, you feel the weight. You feel the weight of the loss of the pain, of the hunger. You sense it in a way that I don't know you always get through pictures, although I believe the Holy Spirit can give the viewers that compassion.

But here's what I believe. I believe the suffering that people go through, and the poverty that people face is a spiritual issue. It's a spiritual issue that we are called to address as believers. You guys saw that, you felt it, and you responded. And I think that's why you've been such a blessing to so many people. I mean, the numbers can be hard to go by in Africa, but the

numbers are way up in the millions of children that have been positively impacted through the mission feeding.

JAMES: Their lives have been totally saved and transformed, and many of them are leaders in their communities. They're changing nations like Mozambique; which has just had the most indescribable impact of almost any nation in history.

You've now been touched by that and going over there for nearly 30 years, and you've just come back. What do you want our viewers to hear? Because you did go to clinics where we're now helping to have better medicine there because that's the last hope some of them have. But we try to get out into the remote areas where they don't have any food. It can be drought, it can be war, it can just be the fact that there doesn't happen to be anything in the area where they are, because of various conditions that are taking place. Oftentimes, they've been pushed out of where they live because of the warring effects of what's going on, the tension that's there.

There's a lot of radical Muslim activity in South Sudan and Sudan. South Sudan has become a stronghold of faith. It's an amazing place. You were just there. What did you see that you want our viewers to understand? Because we are effectively changing things in those areas, and it is the viewer that's making it happen, as much as the missionaries that are there, as much as Betty and me coming back to tell them.

RANDY: Well, yeah. Here's the thing. We think of missions as sort of the calling of missionaries, right? Or maybe the calling of you two, or *Life Outreach International*, but it's far bigger than that. The fascinating thing about when you look at Paul preaching the gospel, I didn't realize this, but there have been, it says in Galatians 2:1, "After an interval of 14 years, I went up again to Jerusalem with Barnabas and taking Titus also." This, again, is Paul talking. "And it was because of a revelation that I went up and I submitted to them." He's talking about the apostles. "I submitted to them the gospel, which I preach among the Gentiles."

So Paul preached for 14 years a gospel that had been revealed to him. Then he went to check with the guys who walked with Jesus and said, "Is this right?" And then, I guess, I don't know

that nobody ever taught this, but there was a long time when Paul was preaching based on what he had seen but hadn't affirmed with the ones who had witnessed it with Christ. Well, the good news, thankfully, is that they did what the Bible calls "extended the right hand of fellowship." The apostles affirmed Paul in the gospel of Christ, which he was preaching. Okay, so we're all good here. But then an interesting thing happens. It says in verse ten, "They," the apostles, "only ask us to remember the poor, the very thing I was also eager to do."

When you're talking about the gospel, and the core of the gospel, affirming Christ in his life and his sacrifice, and that he is the Messiah, the prophecies fulfilled, you don't add anything to that. But they did, "Remember the poor." And so, when I look around and I hear a lot of great things going on in the church, I love my church, I'm blessed by my church. We should be plugged into the local church. But, we have to remember that the core of the gospel is Christ, his lordship, his sacrifice, and his resurrection, and it's remembering the poor.

What does remembering the poor look like? Well, Jesus talked about this many times. James talked about it in his book. It is seeing that need and meeting it. It's that simple. But we overlook this. Sometimes, we put it off on someone else. God is calling the Church of America, the Church of the West, and the church in affluent areas that have the means to remember the poor. And how do we do it? We open our eyes, we see the need, and we respond as we can. You can't give anything you don't have, but you can give what you do have, and every little bit counts.

I believe this is what you've been doing for decades now, and I believe this is what *Life*Outreach International will continue to do for many more decades. Call people back to Christ, the Messiah, and the church, as meeting the needs of the poor.

BETTY: When I was a young girl, I used to pray. I grew up in church. You know my story, Randy. I grew up in church but prayed God, please don't ever call me to be a missionary! I separated that from when I came to -- in other words, I thought that was something extra that people did. I could be a Christian without being a missionary. I now believe that the moment I accepted Jesus into my heart, I became a missionary. A missionary of his spiritual truth, but a

missionary to help those in physical need, hunger, sickness, whatever! It's all together. I think that's what you were saying, Randy. It's not separate. It's the full gospel.

RANDY: So, you know I said that poverty and suffering is a spiritual issue. When we go in with the mission feeding program, we meet that immediate need. That's what that bowl of soup does. It meets that immediate need of hunger. I want them to show some pictures. There's some images we saw on this last trip, and it's the contrast. You have villages where mission feeding has been operating now, and you have villages where mission feeding is desperately needed. When you look at the children in those two places, you see a drastic difference. Not just physically, it is very, very visible physically, but what you may not see is there is a difference in the spirit of the child. Where mission feeding doesn't exist that spirit is broken, it's crushed. It's barely clinging to life. But where mission feeding exists, that spirit is learning. And in one village we went to, singing, clapping. Because what you see is hope and a future. That's what God wants to bring to everyone on earth: hope and a future.

Then, what you also see is a little, small portable stage that goes into villages. We witnessed this. In fact, Isak and I got up on stage, and just briefly addressed them. And then, John Yeatts, our missions director, preached the gospel. John's a pastor, man. You have a pastor for a missions director. He goes out there and whether it's on a stage or whether it's with a group of children sitting around him in some remote, hot, dusty place, John's preaching the gospel to these people because that's the core of mission feeding as well. It's the gospel in word and deed. I mean, you guys wrote it out decades ago. We're here, *Life Outreach International* is here to share the love of God in word and deed. So, we do the deed because faith without works is dead. And we preach the word because we're not just meeting the immediate physical need, but we're meeting the eternal spiritual need.

JAMES: We will never stop feeding the hungry. We will never stop trying to give clean water where they've never had it. I'm praying for God to use us to inspire getting non-contaminated water to every person on earth. I believe that can happen. I believe the miracles for it to happen are already in place. But the real miracle that makes all this happen is the love of God, Randy through people who are watching right now. They're listening to what we're saying about very

legitimate needs. They're listening to us tell them that there are people sent by God, gifted by God, who have planted their family in the midst of that suffering as missionaries.

Betty, you know that we have told all of our viewers that we told Peter Pretorius and the missionaries when they first took us into the suffering, and we said, "Well, we're just going to come here." I'd been preaching crusades for more than 35 years. And now that I've been on the mission field less than two years, I said, "We'll just come and stay here." Peter and the missionaries around him said, "Don't do that!" I thought, well, I guess they think Americans would be a little trouble to take care of. No, that wasn't it at all. They said, "Please go back and get some help for us so we can stay here and be effective and not be empty-handed." And now then, for over 30 years, you have made that possible. It's been a miracle, hasn't it?

BETTY: It really has. And you are such an important part of what God is doing through this ministry. We couldn't do it without you. Thank you, thank you, thank you! It's not enough to say thank you for loving these children who so desperately need hope. They need food right now. They're starving to death. Their mothers are watching them die in their arms. It's so sad! But you bring hope to them by helping *Life Outreach/Life Today* give to these children, and to give these mothers hope.

JAMES: Randy, you went into some of the clinics and saw how the malnourished, how at the last point they came to a clinic hoping to have help. And, you saw them bury one while you were there. Well, Mom and I saw them burying hundreds of them, ultimately thousands. And it was in an area of Angola. We said, God, please help us stop this death cycle. Please, God! And a miracle came and you helped us turn a graveyard into a miracle resurrection center. That was so great, Randy, that they built a church around the children and the pastor. And those children were so full of the life of God, they looked like they had never been hungry a day in their lives.

But also, while we were there, Mom and I went to one of those clinics that had very little. You watched, and I watched a little baby die. They were trying to pump oxygen with a little pump. They didn't have enough. And the mother and all of us watched that little baby die. And Mom held onto that lady who was weeping. I mean, just about to die. It was just breaking my heart.

Here's what I want all of you to hear. A miracle occurred right there at that hospital. Two years later, after people like you helped us take more medicine in, more help in, we took a small breathing unit in. It just changed everything. Betty, one of the most famous pictures in the history of the world was taken there. It was Princess Di holding the prettiest, chubbiest, little baby you ever saw in your life standing right there in that clinic, right outside, where we had put everything in there that brought many babies to a place like that. And Princess Di said, "We have got to help the poor." She made one of the greatest appeals to help the poor that's ever been made.

Randy, that's what happens when people like these who are watching enable us to meet needs and enable the missionaries not to be empty-handed, not to just have a hope and a wish, but an ability to help change everything. And then imagine getting a testimony like that that not only was a beautiful picture of the effect of love, to give a dying baby, one of the prettiest little babies anybody had ever seen, but a charge to the whole world from one of the most famous people that ever lived to "Let's help the poor."

That's what we're asking you to do right now. We're asking you to help us in mission feeding to feed thousands, 350,000 that we have located in areas that have a desperate need where we've turned everything around in so many places, but there are many more to go. Would you help us get the food into those areas, please? The missionaries are there. I believe *Life Outreach* is about outreach for life. That's what we do. It's what *Life Outreach* will do forever. Isn't that so, Randy?

RANDY: Yeah. One of the most startling things I have seen in the mission field was in Angola, not too far from the clinic I think you're talking about. We have several. But there is a field where they dig graves before anyone is brought there. And they dig small graves. They dig graves that are obviously for children.

JAMES: Yeah! And babies nearly.

RANDY: And they wait because the expectation is that some child will die in the next few days, and we will have a place already for that child -- a grave! And my prayer, and I know your prayer, and really, the result of the actions of many over the years, those graves haven't always been filled. I want *Life Outreach* to be that grave robber. The one that says we dug a grave and nobody showed up for it. Do you know why? Because the viewers of *Life Outreach International* said, you know what? We're going to stop that death process. We're going to give them life. And that grave goes unfilled. That's my prayer.

JAMES: Can you tell our viewers that you've watched what's happened with Mom and Dad, and the ministry that our viewers have made possible, but are you confident that *Life Outreach* will continue to do effectively what we've been doing all through our life and just continue on if we have the people who say, I will be the support, I will help, I will not leave people in desperate need. I'll stand.

RANDY: It's not just my commitment. It's the commitment of all the people that aren't seen. Because I know the people who work here, many have worked here for decades. A few of them their whole lives, they have worked here. Why? Because they love the gospel and they love the mission outreaches. They love God in word and deed. And that's what you've done. And that is what we will continue to do. The great news is I've just returned from Africa and I got to talk to Isak Pretorius, who is continuing the work that you began with his father, Peter. And his commitment is firm. Mission feeding will continue because the gospel will continue to go forward to those in desperate need as long as our viewers will continue to support it.

JAMES: I want you to watch very prayerfully. I want you to be prepared to get your bank card. You get that my bank card, and I mean, use it like it's a check right now. I want you to make the greatest gift because you will be given the greatest gift, you're going to give life. But you make the largest gift you possibly can, please! Just listen to God's Spirit in your heart and give life.

PETER: You see it always in their hair. You know, the Bible says it's with the measure that you

give.

JAMES: To me, the reward is seeing the lives saved, seeing people learn about the love of

God.

ANNOUNCER: In the late 1980s, Peter and Ann Pretorius met James and Betty Robison of

Life Outreach International sparking a lifelong partnership that started with feeding 5,000

starving children in war-torn Mozambique to what is now 350,000 children a day in several

countries on the continent of Africa.

ISAK: Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Amen.

RANDY: This, to me, is the model I wish everyone would adopt, and of course, the gospel

being the essential part of it. But this is salvation at every level. All of this started decades ago

with your father, my father seeing a need, and out of it, countless lives have been saved.

Through the generations, Isak, I want us to expand, to continue, to save even more lives, and to

reach even more people with the gospel.

Will you stand with me if I stand with you?

ISAK: If you'll stand with us, we're here. We're going to do this. Our commitment is there to

not just continue the work but to do the work on a broader scale, on a deeper scale.

RANDY: Where it's needed! They need it! They're dying!

ISAK: Let's dream together of a day where we're not just saving lives, where we actually don't even have to do that anymore because we've had the level of impact that we needed to have in our generation.

RANDY: We're standing with each other. Will you stand with us as we stand for these children?

JAMES: Betty and I are not planning on going anywhere but we have enough wisdom to know that the future of a ministry doesn't depend upon the life of two people, or any one person but Jesus. But Jesus uses people to accomplish his will and purpose. We do know that the starving and the hungry, the least of these were a focal point of Jesus. He says the people who do this are my sheep. They're the ones that you can know, know me. You don't have to wonder about it.

I want to thank you for your love for Jesus, and the fact that you know how much he cares, and you want to do what he wants you to do and put his arms around the least of these and give them food, give them water, and do everything we can to help. Seeing this ministry here and all of the staff that's committed to that is a beautiful thing. It can be beautiful, but it doesn't mean a lot if the people don't stand with us.

BETTY: Well, I've just been so blessed, James, even reminiscing as we watched you and I there with Peter and Ann and remembering the hard trips. Yes, they were hard. But we always came home, and I felt, God, thank you for blessing us. We were able to see what you see and to know that there is such a need there that we can make a difference. So, thank you, God, and thank all of you for joining with us to notice these little ones.
